22	COUNT 1		
23	From a time unknown to on or about July 8, 2016, at or near Nogales, Phoenix, and		
24	elsewhere within the District of Arizona, the defendants, ANA GUADALUPE CARILLO-		
25	VILLA and MIGUEL OCHOA-RUIZ, did knowingly and intentionally combine, conspire,		
26	confederate, and agree together and with persons known and unknown to the grand jury,		
27	to commit offenses against the United States, that is: the knowing attempt to export and		
28	send from the United States any merchandise, article, or object contrary to any law or		

regulation of the United States, and to receive, conceal, buy, sell, and in any manner facilitate the transportation, concealment, and sale of such merchandise, article or object, prior to exportation, knowing the same to be intended for exportation contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, to wit: Title 22, United States Code, Section 2778; Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 121.1; and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 123.1; in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 554(a).

Purpose of the Conspiracy

The purpose of this conspiracy was to commit, and assist in the commission of, the unlawful export of ammunition and firearm components, including: 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, 90 30-round AR-15 magazines, 156 30-round AK magazines, 2 100-round AR-15 magazines, 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x39mm ammunition, 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition and 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition from the United States to the Republic of Mexico.

The Means and Methods of the Conspiracy

The means and methods employed by the defendants and their co-conspirators to carry out the conspiracy and effect its unlawful objects are as follows:

It was part of the conspiracy that the defendants and/or their co-conspirators would purchase ammunition and firearm components in the District of Arizona.

It was a further part of the conspiracy that the defendants and/or their coconspirators would provide the funds, instructions, and means of transportation and concealment to facilitate the purchase of the ammunition and firearm components.

It was a further part of the conspiracy that the defendants and/or their coconspirators would transport the ammunition and firearm components within the District of Arizona with the knowledge that the ammunition and firearm components were intended to ultimately be transported from the United States into the Republic of Mexico, and/or transport the ammunition and firearm components from the United States into the Republic of Mexico.

It was a further part of the conspiracy that the defendants and/or their coconspirators did not have any valid license or other authority to export the ammunition and firearm components from the United States into the Republic of Mexico.

Overt Acts

 In furtherance of the conspiracy, one or more of the co-conspirators committed, or caused to be committed, the overt acts described below:

On July 7, 2016, at United Nations Ammo Company in Phoenix, Arizona, MIGUEL OCHOA-RUIZ purchased 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, 90 30-round AR-15 magazines, 156 30-round AK magazines, 2 100-round AR-15 magazines, 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x39mm ammunition, 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition and 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition. OCHOA-RUIZ then loaded the ammunition and magazines in a black Chevrolet Silverado which was registered to him. While OCHOA-

Avalon. OCHOA-RUIZ left the United Nations Ammo Company driving the Chevrolet

RUIZ was loading the items into his vehicle, another vehicle (a Toyota Avalon) met up

with him. A female that had been accompanying OCHOA-RUIZ then got into the Toyota

Both vehicles traveled from Phoenix to Nogales, Arizona, where OCHOA-RUIZ turned the Chevrolet Silverado over to ANA GUADALUPE CARRILLO-VILLA in the McDonald's parking lot. OCHOA-RUIZ then got into the driver's seat of the Toyota Avalon and departed the United States through the Nogales Port of Entry in that vehicle.

CARILLO-VILLA attempted to exit the United States and enter the Republic of Mexico through the Nogales Port of Entry as the driver and sole occupant of the Chevrolet Silverado. Upon inspection and questioning by Customs and Border Protection officers, CARILLO-VILLA eventually admitted to transporting ammunition. Officers discovered 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, 90 30-round AR-15 magazines, 156 30-round AK magazines, and 2 100-round AR-15 magazines in boxes in the back seat area of the vehicle.

On July 8, 2016, OCHOA-RUIZ was encountered by law enforcement agents in the McDonald's parking lot in Nogales, Arizona. OCHOA-RUIZ was found in possession of 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x39mm ammunition, 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition, 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition. OCHOA-RUIZ intended to take this ammunition from the United States into the Republic of Mexico.

OCHOA-RUIZ and CARRILLO-VILLA acted in concert in the attempt to smuggle the ammunition and firearm components from the United States into the Republic of Mexico. Neither OCHOA-RUIZ nor CARILLO-VILLA had a license, permit, or other lawful authority to export the ammunition and firearms components from the United States into the Republic of Mexico

All in violation of 18 U.S.C. Section 371.

COUNT 2

On or about July 7, 2016, at or near Phoenix and Nogales, in the District of Arizona, MIGUEL OCHOA-RUIZ knowingly attempted to export and send from the United States any merchandise, article, or object contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, and bought and transported such merchandise, article or object, to wit: 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, 90 30-round AR-15 magazines, 156 30-round AK magazines, 2 100-round AR-15 magazines, 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x39mm ammunition, 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition and 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition; knowing the same to be intended for exportation contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, to wit: Title 22, United States Code, Section 2778; Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 121.1; and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 123.1; in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 554(a).

COUNT 3

On or about July 7, 2016, at or near Nogales, in the District of Arizona, ANA GUADALUPE CARILLO-VILLA knowingly attempted to export and send from the United States any merchandise, article, or object contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, and received and transported such merchandise, article or object, to wit: 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, 90 30-round AR-15 magazines, 156 30-round AK magazines, and 2 100-round AR-15 magazines; knowing the same to be intended for exportation contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, to wit: Title 22, United States Code, Section 2778; Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 121.1; and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 123.1; in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 554(a).

COUNT 4

On or about July 7, 2016, at or near Nogales, in the District of Arizona, ANA GUADALUPE CARILLO-VILLA, having been previously convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment for a term exceeding one year; that is, Conspiracy to Possess With Intent to Distribute Heroin, a felony offense, in United States District Court, Tucson, Arizona, case number CR 14-00397-003-TUC-RCC (BPV), on October 14, 2014; did knowingly possess ammunition, that is, 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition, said ammunition being in and affecting commerce in that it was previously transported into the state of Arizona from another state or foreign country; in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 922(g)(1) and 924(a)(2).

COUNT 5

On or about July 8, 2016, at or near Nogales, in the District of Arizona, MIGUEL OCHOA-RUIZ knowingly attempted to export and send from the United States any merchandise, article, or object contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, and transported such merchandise, article or object, to wit: 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x39mm ammunition, 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition and 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition; knowing the same to be intended for exportation contrary to any law or regulation of the United States, to wit: Title 22, United States Code, Section 2778; Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 121.1; and Title 22, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 123.1; in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 554(a).

FORFEITURE ALLEGATION

Upon conviction of Counts One through Five of the Indictment, defendants, ANA GUADALUPE CARILLO-VILLA and MIGUEL OCHOA-RUIZ, shall forfeit to the United States pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 924(d), and Title 28, United States Code, Section 2461(c), any firearms and ammunition involved in the commission of the offense, including, but not limited to 2,000 rounds of 7.62x39mm ammunition; 8,000 rounds of Wolf 7.62x 9mm ammunition; 2,000 rounds of Magtec 9mm Luger ammunition; and 1,000 rounds of Aguila .40 S&W ammunition.

If any of the property described above, as a result of any act or omission of the defendants: a) cannot be located upon the exercise of due diligence; b) has been transferred or sold to, or deposited with, a third party; c) has been placed beyond the jurisdiction of the court; d) has been substantially diminished in value; or e) has been commingled with other property which cannot be divided without difficulty, it is the intent of the United States, pursuant to Title 21, United States Code, Section 853(p), as incorporated by Title 28, United States Code, Section 2461(c), to seek forfeiture of any other property of said defendants up to the value of the above forfeitable property, including, but not limited to, all property, both real and personal, owned by the defendants.

All pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 924(d), Title 28, United States Code, Section 2461(c) and Rule 32.2(a), Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure.
